

BEFORE READING

Learn these important words before you read the story. They will help you to read more smoothly.

destroy (v.) to damage something completely

empire (n.) a group of states or people that are controlled by a single ruler

explorer (n.) a person whose job is to discover and learn about new or unfamiliar places

factory (n.) a building where goods are made, often by machine

god (n.) in literature, a supernatural and superhuman being who is immortal

goods (n.) useful items which are bought and sold in trade

immortal (adj.) living forever; never dying

natives (n.) people who are born in a certain place

peaceful (adj.) to be in peace; calm; not war-like

queen (n.) the female ruler of a state, often by family right

revolution (n.) to change a ruler or system of power, often by force

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scientist (n.) a person whose job is to study the natural world

sink (v.) to fall below the surface of something, usually water

tool (n.) something used to do a certain kind of work

university (n.) an advanced level school, often specializing in arts and sciences

EXTENSION QUESTIONS

Reading a good story can make you think about new things. Talk about these questions with your friends or teacher, or find out more online. Not all questions have a clear or simple answer!

- 1. In this story, Edin is called an 'empire'. What is the difference between an 'empire', a 'civilization', a 'country', and a 'nation'?
- 2. What are the oldest empires in the world that still survive today? How old are they? How did they survive for so long?
- 3. What do you know about long-ago empires such as the Romans, the Maya, and the Egyptians? Why do some empires die off?
- 4. In one of the endings, Edin changes from being ruled by a queen to being a democracy. What is good and bad about this?
- 5. In the story, Edin builds a wall to protect itself. Do you know about the Great Wall of China? What do you know about it?
- 6. In the story, there is a workers' revolution. In the real world, this idea comes from Karl Marx. What do you know about Marx?
- 7. In the story, a scientist is killed because of her ideas. Did this ever happen in world history? Can you find some examples?
- 8. In the story, you speak to people in their dreams. In the real world, what are some famous ideas that people had in dreams?
- 9. In the story, you are immortal. What would it be like to really be immortal? Is it possible that humans could one day live forever?
- 10. If you could change only one real historical event in the past, what would it be? How would it change the future?
