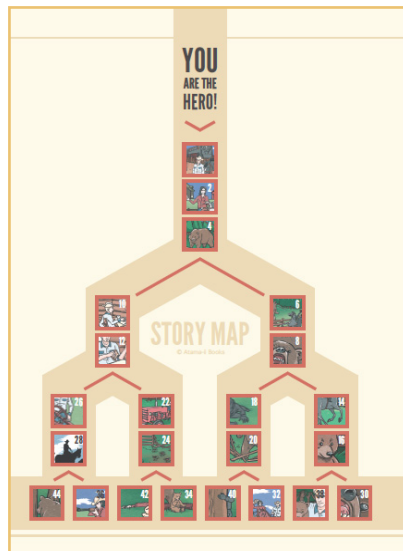
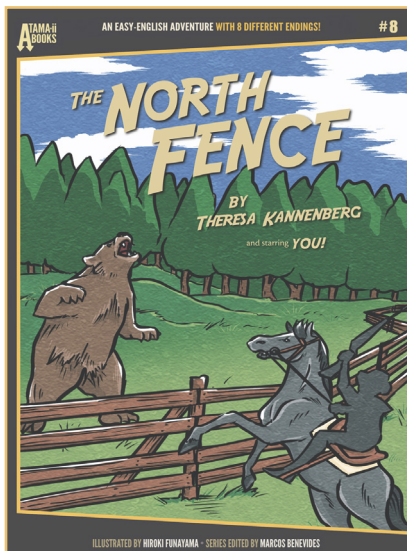


BEFORE READING

Learn these important words before you read the story.

barn (n.) a large building on a farm, used for housing animals

cub (n.) a young bear (or young lion, wolf, fox, etc.)

drop (v.) to let go of something so that it falls

farm (n.) a large area of land used for growing food plants and animals

fence (n.) a barrier which encloses a place, to keep people and animals in or out; often made of wood

fix (v.) to make something which is broken work again; to repair

handgun (n.) a small gun which can be used with one hand

hunt (v.) to go looking for an animal, with the purpose of catching or killing it

post (n.) the vertical pieces of wood that support a fence

ranch (n.) a kind of farm that specializes in animals, such as cows and horses

ranch hand (n.) a person who works on a ranch as an employee

rear up (v.) when a four-legged animal stands up on its back legs

roar (n.) the sound an animal, such as a bear or a lion, makes when it is angry

scare (v.) to cause someone to feel fear; to make someone afraid

shoot (v.) to fire a gun

shot (n.) the sound made by a gun

track (n.) a mark made on the ground by an animal or person

trap (n.) something used to catch an animal

EXTENSION QUESTIONS

Reading a good story can make you think about new things. Talk about these questions with your friends or teacher, or find out more online. Not all questions have a clear or simple answer!

1. What do you know about Saskatchewan, Canada? How many people live there? Are there any large cities or other attractions?
2. This story takes place in 1910. That's a long time ago. What do you know about Canada and the USA in the early 1900s?
3. In the early 1900s, many people moved from England and other countries to live in Canada. Why do you think they moved?
4. In this story, Gilbert uses a motorized tractor to farm his land. When and where were the first tractors invented?
5. In the story, there is a large brown bear. What kinds of bears are there, and which ones are the most dangerous?
6. Bears usually live deep in the forest and avoid people. What are some reasons why bears might come into a farm or a ranch?
7. Bears are common in Canada, and they can be dangerous. What should you do if you meet a bear face to face?
8. In the story, the rancher eats bears. Have you ever eaten a wild or unusual animal? How was it?
9. In the story, the ranchers hunt the bear. Hunting is a popular sport in Canada. What do you think about sport hunting?
10. In the 1900s, most farmers built their own houses. Could you build a whole house by yourself? What would you need?
